
In short, to be a leader is to be a missionary.

CONFESSION

Our contentment with what we know keeps us from what we could know.

We are not teachable. Honestly, I think we use "I know"...

...to shut out the active guidance of the Spirit.

...to excuse our disobedience.

Only when we can be transparent about this reality in our hearts and its impact can we begin to expose the lie and find restoration in Christ.

SHARE HIS LIFE

He will be with you forever. He is the Spirit of truth. [John 14:17]

He will keep telling you about Jesus. [John 15:26]

So, since we have the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit. [Galatians 5:25]

As leaders, we lay aside our "I Knows" in favor of His step-by-step guidance.



MISSION AS MISSIONAL MANDATE

where every person joins Jesus on His mission.

"connect people to life in Jesus."

Even if we admit we don't know, without guidance we fail to move forward. Surely God wants to take us somewhere new, where we see His grace more clearly. He wants us to participate in His mission. We get to contribute to something that is much bigger than ourselves. That "something" is our **compass**.

It is what we are ultimately supposed to be doing no matter the terrain or environment. The mission is timeless. It expresses a direction and points everyone in that direction. The mission is like a thread that weaves through every activity of the church.



Jesus uses a word picture:

I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing. If you do not remain in me, you are like a branch that is thrown away and withers; such branches are picked up, thrown into the fire and burned. [John 15:5-6]


Through faith in Jesus

VALUES AS MISSIONAL MOTIVES

where everyday life becomes so much more.

On any given day there are a thousand things clamoring for our attention, a multiplicity of motivations that move us. What we value will either direct us back toward center or divert us from what is truly worthwhile. Values are the **motivational flame** of the church. They are the shared convictions that guide actions and reveal our unique strengths. These motives answer "Why do we do what we do at our church?" They are springboards for daily action and filters for decision-making. They distinguish our philosophy of ministry and shape our culture and ethos.

As a community of believers at the Church, we affirm five core values that we like to refer to as our missional motives.

Ordinary+

because ordinary people connected to Jesus share in Christ's extraordinary mission. [Mark 1:16-18; John 4:1-30, 39-42; John 15:16; Acts 4:13]

Step+

because simple steps guided by Jesus accelerate the impact of new life. [Joshua 1:1-9; Joshua 5:13-15; Matthew 14:13-21; Acts 8:26-27a]

Friendship+

because friendships infused with Jesus expand the reach of true community. [Matthew 18:20; John 1:38-39; 1 Thessalonians 2:8; 1 John 4:10-12]

Generosity+

because generosity empowered by Jesus fuels a contagious, others-centered culture. [1 Chronicles 29; Luke 21:1-4; John 12:1-8; 2 Corinthians 8:1-9]

Home+

because a home centered on Jesus becomes the epicenter of an active life of faith. [Deuteronomy 6:1-9; Psalm 128; Luke 8:38-39; Ephesians 5:21-6:4]

As leaders, we are compelled and gripped by these values.

HOW DO THESE VALUES


lead and guide you?

If you've gotten anything at all out of following Christ, if his love has made any difference in your life, if being in a community of the Spirit means anything to you, if you have a heart, if you care — then do me a favor: Agree with each other, love each other, be deep-spirited friends. Don't push your way to the front; don't sweet-talk your way to the top. Put yourself aside, and help others get ahead. Don't be obsessed with getting your own advantage. Forget yourselves long enough to lend a helping hand.

Think of yourselves the way Christ Jesus thought of himself. He had equal status with God but didn't think so much of himself that he had to cling to the advantages of that status no matter what. Not at all. When the time came, he set aside the privileges of deity and took on the status of a slave, became human! Having become human, he stayed human. It was an incredibly humbling process. He didn't claim special privileges. Instead, he lived a selfless, obedient life and then died a selfless, obedient death — and the worst kind of death at that — a crucifixion.

Because of that obedience, God lifted him high and honored him far beyond anyone or anything, ever, so that all created beings in heaven and on earth — even those long ago dead and buried — will bow in worship before this Jesus Christ, and call out in praise that he is the Master of all, to the glorious honor of God the Father.

STRATEGY AS MISSIONAL MAP

where people make intentional moves to grow.

A carefully crafted strategy is the essential ingredient to a successful mission. It is the picture that demonstrates how we will accomplish our mission on the broadest level. Strategy answers the question "How do we do what we do?" It is a **flashlight** that will help new people clearly see next steps and guide membership to a clear understanding of expectations. Strategy is like a container that holds all organization activities into one meaningful whole. Without this picture individuals within the church will forget how each work component fits into the mission. They will be lost in a programmatic soup of random activity. Think of strategy as a pattern of participation that clarifies places and rhythms of being involved. It is our operational logic. In that way it functions as a missional map.

the Church's strategy or missional map has three components, which, when they are put together, build a connecting lifestyle.



In all of activity at the Church it is our purpose to lead people to demonstrate and share the love of God in Jesus. We are not merely interested in providing church programming for people, but in nurturing a connecting lifestyle in them. That's what we mean by "connecting lifestyles." It's not just a program or an event, it's a way of life!




We join together to focus on Jesus, offer Him praise, and allow Him the space to speak to us. lifeWorship is an exciting part of the Church experience.




Authentic biblical community requires deep connections. Our connection to other people is at the heart of our Christian experience. Though we often experience worship in a large setting with many other people, authentic connections happen most effectively in smaller groups where there is opportunity for dialog and relationships. In lifeGroup, people at all different stages of their spiritual journey grow together in Christian fellowship as they worship, experience God, minister to one another, and serve together in their community.






How are you embracing our strategy?

LIFE MARKS AS MISSIONAL MEASURES

where people become more like Jesus.

Is God really doing anything at the Church and how will we know?

We will never publish enough newsletters or send enough emails to validate God's work in our midst. This isn't about what "should be" based on our mission and our values. It's about what is — what is happening in your life? What is changing in our community as a result of being connected to life in Jesus?

Our Life Marks articulate the attributes of an individual's life that are evident when they are living life in Jesus. Our Life Marks act as missional measures and are visualized as a bull's eye. These provide the standard by which the mission can be measured.

As a community of believers, we expectantly anticipate that as we follow God's leading, we will each see clear evidence of His work. As we "connect people to life in Jesus," things will change. Growth will take place. Lives will be restored. So you should be able to say:

• I am SUSTAINED by the Word.

Bible: Am I reading, reflecting on, and responding to God's Word daily? [Exodus 16:13-21; John 6:32-35]

Grow: Would people closest to me recognize that I have a growing relationship with Jesus? [Acts 4:13]

Worship: Does personal and public worship hold a sacred place in my life? [Acts 2:42-47; Hebrews 10:19-22]

Community: Am I being sharpened by God's Word in relationship with other Christians? [Acts 4:23-31; Hebrews 10:23-25]

• I am DEPENDENT on Christ.

Grace: Have I received Jesus by faith and do I allow Him to love and accept me in spite of who I am? [Galatians 2:21]

Surrender: Am I giving up my idols to give Jesus center stage in my life? [Genesis 35:1-2; Jeremiah 1:16; Romans 1:21-23; James 4:4; 1 John 5:20-21]

Focus: Do my calendar, relationships, and checkbook display that I am fully relying on God? [Matthew 6:19-21; Matthew 7:16-17; James 1:22; James 2:14-26]

Prayer: Am I pursuing a more intimate relationship with God by allowing time for conversation with Him? [Psalms 5:1-12; Daniel 6:10; James 5:13-18; Revelation 3:20]

• I am a visible REFLECTION of Jesus.

Love: Am I intentionally blessing neighbors and friends with a compassionate heart? [Matthew 22:37-40; John 13:34-35; Romans 13:9; 1 John 4:11]

Obey: Am I listening for what God wants me to do and following through? [Numbers 9:23; 1 Kings 19:11-13; Acts 10:1-48]

Purpose: Can I complete this statement: "I am making disciples and glorifying God by _____?" [Esther 4:13-14; John 6:38; 2 Thessalonians 1:11-12; Titus 1:1-2]

Team: Am I playing my part well alongside others to make a Kingdom impact? [Ephesians 4:16 & Nehemiah 2:18b]

• I am the MISSIONAL heartbeat of God.

Discern: Who is God placing on my impact list? [Acts 8:26-40; Acts 16:6-10]


Friend: Do I delight in sharing my life with others?

[1 Thess. 2:8]

Proclaim: Am I prepared and willing to speak the truth about Jesus when given the opportunity?

[1 Peter 3:15]

Teach: Am I helping another believer live life with Jesus? [2 Timothy 2:2]



We want to be a church that relentlessly asks these questions of one another because we believe they prompt us to remember our life in Jesus and to evaluate how we are doing together at "Connecting people to life in Jesus."

You yourselves are our letter, written on our hearts, known and read by everyone, revealing that you are a letter of Christ, delivered by us, written not with ink but by the Spirit of the living God, not on stone tablets but on tablets of human hearts.
